Safety considerations

- **Secure restraint:** Use a pet seat belt, car harness, or a secure crate to keep your dog safely restrained while the vehicle is on the move. This stops them from getting in the way of the driver and keeps them safe in case of any sudden stops or accidents.
- **Temperature control:** Always ensure proper ventilation and climate control inside the vehicle. Never leave your dog alone in a parked car, as temperatures can rise or fall quickly without you realising, and become dangerous.
- **Puppy-proof the vehicle:** Make sure there are no loose objects or items your dog can chew on.

Supervising your dog while you travel

When you are travelling with a dog on shorter trips, you will need to keep an eye on them. Make sure your dog has regular breaks and give them some water to help keep them hydrated, and they will be more comfortable.

- **Frequent breaks:** Make regular stops every hour or so to let your dog stretch, have a toilet break, and get some fresh air.
- **Water and food:** Carry a travel bowl and water to keep your dog hydrated. If the trip is long enough to require a meal, pack some food as well, but avoid feeding your dog right before travel so they don't get queasy.

Planning a dog-friendly route

Planning ahead can make a world of difference when you are travelling with dogs. Figuring out your route first, including stops and rest areas can make a big difference to the experience for you and your pooch.

- **Identify pet-friendly stops:** Look for parks, rest areas, or pet-friendly businesses along your route where your dog can take a break.
- **Avoid high-traffic areas:** Try to plan your route to avoid heavy traffic when travelling with a dog, as this can make the journey longer and more stressful for both you and your dog.

Travelling long distances

[Long-distance travel](#), whether by car or plane, requires a few extra considerations to ensure your dog's well-being throughout the journey. Travelling Australia with a dog can be done but you need to be prepared.

Vet checks
